## Community Chests QUIZ



Q—Does the chest plan force a subscriber to support some organizations to which he would not contribute otherwise?

A—No. Every subscriber has the privilege of designating his subscription to the agency or agencies he wishes to support. When he gives to the chests, he is supporting his favorite social agencies in the most efficient manner possible. There are enough other chest contributors who may not care to support the agencies in which he is interested, so that his gift can be considered as going only to those agencies to which he would have contributed if they had approached him individually.

In other words, the chest is simply a method by which the citizens of this community save money in financing the social work which they collectively wish to see maintained.

Q—How does a subscriber know that his contribution goes to the agencies he wishes to support?

A—Subscriptions designated to certain agencies are credited to their allotment and a list of subscribers sent to the agencies to which subscriptions are designated, if requested.

Q—If an agency is designated more than its allotment, will it be given the total amount subscribed, or will the surplus be divided among other agencies?

A—No individual agency has ever had more than three-quarters of its allotment designated by subscribers. Only 16.8 per cent. of the total amount subscribed in the last campaign was designated to individual agencies. If an agency should be designated more than its budget requires, the agency would be notified of the total amount assigned to it, and the surplus would be held in trust for that agency.
