



## Is your TV zapping back?

Reports of radiation from electrical devices spark controversy

If TV makes you ill, it may have little to do with program selection.

Critics contend there is growing evidence that radiation from everyday electrical devices like television sets, electric blankets and even hydro wires may pose a serious health hazard.

And that is sparking some controversies between industry and the public.

A Florida man recently launched a suit alleging his wife died of a brain tumor caused by weak electromagnetic radiation from her cellular phone.

In Sweden, a major study found increases in the incidence of leukemia among people living along a hydro right-of-way.

Closer to home, Canadian police have begun to wonder if the radar gun they've used for years has been causing testicular cancer.

At the core of these controversies is the issue of "electropollution" — the possible harmful biological effects of low-level electromagnetic fields (EMFs) now common in the workplace and home.


Because all electrical devices produce EMFs, electropollution involves everything from extremely low-frequency power lines to high-frequency microwave ovens, cellular phones and the radar gun.

Video display terminals, electric shavers, and even fluorescent lights are seen as contributors to a constant invisible attack on the human body.

Critics like Dr. Robert Becker of Lowville, N.Y., an author and pioneering researcher on the medical use of EMFs, contend electromagnetic radiation may be responsible for problems ranging from weakened immune systems to certain forms of cancer and birth defects.

Industry and government spokesmen involved in forging guidelines that govern EMF exposure argue such conclusions are either inconclusive or just plain wrong.

Art Thansandote, a researcher with Health and Welfare Canada, said the field levels of the cellular phone and radar gun are less than a sixth of those allowed

under the guidelines. "You could talk on that phone for eight hours a day" without worrying about ill effects, he said.

But Dr. William Adey, associate chief of research and development at the Pettis Memorial VA Medical Centre in Loma Linda, Calif., said those standards were based on the idea that there would be no adverse effects unless the electromagnetic field was strong enough to cause tissues to be heated.

"That is profoundly wrong. And it is wrong now on both the theoretical and experimental grounds," Adey said.

"Our work, and much other work around the world from unquestionably reliable sources shows that there are a whole range of interactions that do not depend on heating" but on how magnetic fields act on molecular structures within cells, he said.

And he said recent work at Oxford University in Britain shows "this sensitivity goes all the way down to zero energy."

Becker says the growing evi-

dence against power field frequencies is at least as strong as that linking cigarettes and lung cancer, and called the Swedish study "the last nail in the coffin." Besides being "dose-related," Becher said the study suggested there were cancer-inducing effects at below one milligauss, a level he had previously believed could be relied upon as a practical safety standard. The gauss is a unit used to measure the strength of magnetic fields.

Ontario Hydro, which adheres to a voluntary guideline of 50 milligauss or less at the edge of its right of ways, described the Swedish study as preliminary and subject to revision.

Hydro spokesman Paul Newall said that, while he didn't want to underestimate its significance, the Swedish study is just one of hundreds that may not yield an accurate assessment of risk factors for another 15 years or more.

"We may not have a definitive response even at that time," he said.

## No need to pull the plug, expert says

Answers to the problem of electro-pollution can't be found in a return to some idyllic, pastoral life-style, says a pioneer in the health effects of low-level electromagnetic fields.

"We're not going to turn off the electric power; we're not going to stop using cellular phones," says Dr. William Adey of Pettis Memorial VA Medical Centre in Loma Linda, Calif.

"What we have to do is learn to make them safer and I think we can do that."

Take the police radar gun as an example, says Adey, associate chief of research at Pettis and a professor of medicine at the affiliated Loma Linda University Medical School.

Early models of the hand-held radar gun, a device the Canadian Police Association wants banned because of a suspected link with testicular cancer, operated at the two gigahertz frequency range in the S-band of the microwave spectrum.

"These undoubtedly put a lot of juice into the body," Adey said. "I think if you look at the medical records of a lot of these police guys who now have trouble, when they began using them 10, 15 years ago, these were S-band guns."

Policemen often rested the guns in their laps between use without turning them off.

Modern radar guns use less power with weaker electromagnetic fields and they operate at higher frequencies in the 10 or 24 gigahertz range — believed to have a reduced ability to penetrate the body.

Police radar now under development is expected to operate at 90 gigahertz and produce even weaker fields, he said.

"So, human ingenuity applied to the technological need is reducing the exposure to the point where the problem is probably going to go away."

Ninety gigahertz is not going to penetrate into the body tissues."

Adey also cited the example of "the hoo-haw" over video display terminals.

"As long as we used cathode ray terminals, yes, there is a significant magnetic field," he said.

"But everyone of us who has a laptop computer has completely circumvented that problem because the liquid crystal display has no magnetic field."

Adey also sees a future "of tremendous importance" for low-level electromagnetic fields either separately or in combination with drugs for therapeutic purposes.

## Manitoba woman cracks credit card fraud racket

**PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE** — Jo-Ann McCabe, manager of a Portage la Prairie travel agency, had no idea she would be unravelling an international credit card fraud ring when she did some checking on a suspicious client last October.

What the Manitoba woman found was a complicated scam that used stolen credit card numbers to order plane tickets, which were then sold illegally. What resulted was a two-year prison term for a California man.

The card numbers were usually taken from credit card carbons or receipts — probably found in the garbage of legitimate businesses. So when the travel agency checked the card, it was always good, never reported stolen or lost.

The scheme was hauling in thousands of dollars and leaving travel agents stuck with the bill. The credit card holders were not responsible for items bought with their card numbers because they never signed the slips.

McCabe's sleuth work began with a routine-sounding call to

her agency, Total Travel. A man who said he worked with the Portage School Division as an exchange teacher wanted to order four tickets for his wife and children to fly from Oakland, Calif., to St. Louis, Mo.

"He gave me a Portage la Prairie phone number and his American Express credit card number," McCabe said. "The credit card was good."

But the seemingly innocent order didn't sit well.

"I felt suspicious," she said. "I just had this gut-feeling." So she decided to do some checking. First she called the airline the client bought the ticket for and asked who had picked it up. The ticket had been picked up by someone working for airport security. When she heard that, her interest was really piqued.

But it wasn't until she talked to a friend also in the Manitoba travel business that she realized a game was really afoot.

"She had also had a request for a prepaid ticket with the same description of the guy who ordered it," McCabe explained.

She sent a special alert to all other travel agents via the computer booking system her agency uses. McCabe had 50 calls the first day and eventually received over 400 from all over Canada and the United States.

McCabe then called the commercial crime division of the RCMP in Winnipeg. She had the phone numbers of the agencies affected as well as the credit card numbers, plane ticket numbers, the departure and arrival cities and the dates of the flights.

The information enabled the San Francisco branch of the U.S. Secret Service to track down at least one culprit. Frank Middleton pleaded guilty to credit card fraud this month and is now serving a two-year prison term.

For their trouble, McCabe and Total Travel were partly reimbursed by the Alliance of Canadian Travel Counsellors for the massive phone bill they rang up while on the case. And last week, the Canadian Institute of Travel Counsellors give McCabe with an citation award for her work in cracking the fraud ring.
